Rodney L. Thompson '62

Brother Thompson graduated from the University of Kansas in 1963 with his Bachelors Degree and earned his M.D. from KU Med in 1967. After graduation he undertook an internship at LA County General Hospital/U. Southern California and an Internal Medicine residency at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, MN. Rod served as a Major in the U.S. Army Medical Corps as the Commanding Officer of the Army health clinic in Munich, Germany from 1971-1974. He returned to Mayo Clinic in 1974 for subspeciality training in Infectious Disease until joining the staff in 1976.

Rod has been a consulting physician at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN for the past 34 years and has received recognition for his educational work in the Mayo Regional Faculty Program and a Department of Medicine Laureate Award for his clinical work. Over the past 36 years, he has authored or co-authored 68 published articles on a variety of topics concerning infectious disease. He was appointed Assistant Professor of Internal Medicine at the Mayo Graduate School of Medicine. Since 1983, he has served as the Infection Control Director for the Mayo Medical Center, affiliated hospitals and out-patient clinics in Rochester. He is a member of national societies and associations in the areas of infection diagnosis, treatment and prevention. From 1990-2000, he served as vice-chair of the Division of Infectious Diseases, the largest clinical Infectious Disease practice in the world.

Brother Thompson resides in Rochester with his wife, Carol, and they have 3 sons and a daughter. His oldest is an ER Physician in Portland, Oregon, his middle two are MBA's from Thunderbird International School of Business and his youngest is a Sophomore at KU Med. All are married and Rod has 6 grandchildren. He is a long-time supporter of local community and school programs in Rochester, including the Rochester Figure Skating Club and various youth sports, the Rochester Keyboard Club, a Sunday School teacher and occasional substitute organist at their church.



Brother Thompson had this to say about Gamma-Omicron and Kappa Sigma, "My appreciation for Kappa Sigma probably exceeds most of the brothers because I first lived a year in a dormitory (the new Templin Hall). I drove a junk car, studied all the time, was invisible to the girls, lacked any goals, and generally had no significant life. I do not know if all the improvements in my college life or successes later can be attributable to Kappa Sigma, but many surely can. Life in the fraternity certainly improved my social skills and self-confidence. It provided a stable environment in which to succeed and a social network with which to cling. Despite a marked increase in social activities I was able to find a major, settle on a career in medicine, maintain an adequate grade point average, and get into medical school at KUMC. I am not sure what else one could ask for. Memories from my fraternity days are firm but probably not very reliable. I am not entirely sure if the events really happened or if they were just in the planning stage." Rodney also had this to say about the fraternity and chapter, " In many ways Kappa Sigma was our family The fraternity goals and expectations provided a framework for behavior and personal development. Having the challenge of a college career was an added bonus. I have been a different person since my college days and a better one I like to think. Kappa Sigma was at the time and in the place where I became an adult and deserves much of the credit."

Jack C. Bondon'71

Jack graduated from the University of Kansas in 1974 with a bachelor's degree in psychology. While at the University of Kansas, Brother Bondon was involved with Rock Chalk Review (1971 and 1972) and was also Junior Class Representative. After graduation, Brother Bondon continued to serve the fraternity as President of the Gamma-Omicron Corporation Board from 1983-85. Jack is the owner and operator of BERBIGLIA WINE AND SPIRITS in Kansas City, Missouri.

Jack currently serves on the Board of Regents for Rockhurst University and in 1996 was co-founder of the Kansas City Metro High School Hockey League. Brother Bondon has been married to his KU Sweetheart, Peggy Delta Gamma'71 for 33 years. They met in 1971 at the Rock Chalk Review. He has two children, Michaela (29) and Jack Scott (27).

In the fraternity house at KU is a small plaque that reads:

To the men of Gamma Omicron 1970-1974 In recognition of your rise From ruins to National Excellence Kappa Sigma Alumni

This sums up Jack's life as a brother. When asked what Gamma-Omicron and Kappa Sigma mean to him, Brother Bondon had this to say, "In August



1970 I pledged Kappa Sigma. Although my brother had been a member from 1964 to 1968, I did not know any of the current members. I had met a few at rush and liked them all, it seemed like a great fit for me. Two weeks later I received a phone call telling me that the house had burned down. Many pledges that I had met de-pledged. My mother wanted me to leave also because we had no living quarters. Being my first year in college this would be an extra burden. I thought about it long and hard. I decided it was the friends that I made that made the house what it was, not the physical structure."

They lived in the Gatehouse Apartments for the first semester. They were in foursomes spread out over two blocks and it was two miles to the campus. The brothers made an effort to stick together. They would meet at the pool or for lunch on campus. The fraternity was banished from campus and everyone wrote them off. They could not make it without a house.


Brother Bondon remembers that time, "This burden turned out not to be a burden at all. It was glue, glue that made us stronger and tighter. We vowed to make it. We were as tight as any house on the hill. When we gathered in front of Frazier Hall, everyone pointed at us and said, "There are the Kappa Sigs". It was a cult."

When they moved back to the house nothing changed. They had opportunities that no other house had. They showed the house off in every way possible, to alumni, to the sororities, to the professors, and even to the Sigma Nu's. Brother Bondon's pledge class was one of the smallest in recent years and the next year they had one of the biggest pledge classes on the hill.

"We built ourselves back by being closer and better than anyone else. Most wrote us off and we vowed to make them wrong. I will never forget those years. I will never forget my brothers, they are the closest friends I have in life still today."

The Gamma-Omicron Chapter of Kappa Sigma Fraternity was founded at the University of Kansas on May 18, 1912. We have over 1,000 living alumni and have an undergraduate membership that normally averages about 100 on the Lawrence campus. The stately English Tudor Chapter House at 1045 Emery Road in beautiful "West Hills" was originally built in the 1920's and came into our possession in 1934. Fully renovated, modernized, and refurnished in 1998 at a cost of approximately \$3,000,000, our home comfortably accommodates 76 men and easily ranks among the top living facilities on campus.
