## Report From The Grand Master

### **Grades**

Gamma-Omicron ended the decade with an extremely successful fall semester, and we are looking to carry that momentum into the new year. We began this semester with wonderful news when we learned that the chapter achieved a 3.22 GPA for the fall semester. This considerable academic achievement places us second among the 22 fraternities at the University of Kansas and considerably beat the All Fraternity Average of 2.93. The fall semester marked the fourth straight semester in which Gamma-O has had a GPA of at least 3.0, and it is the third straight semester in which we have seen improvement in our GPA. Our continued improvement and excellence in academics is the result of the Chapter's emphasis on grades and a great deal of hard work by the undergraduate brothers. Undoubtedly, Gamma-O's continued improvement is a sign of great things to come!

## Rush

In addition to the Chapter's academic achievements, progress can also be noted in recent recruitment efforts. Eight new pledges have been signed for the spring semester, making it the largest spring pledge class we have had in the last five years. With 67 brothers already living in the house, the spring pledge class brings the Chapter to 75 members with an additional 10 out-of-house brothers. Rush is a constant priority of ours, and our Rush Chairmen (Kyle Jesse '07, Robby House '07, and Tyler Setter '08) are hard at work signing a large fall pledge. Once again, we will be participating in Formal Rush, June 11-14, to supplement our informal rush efforts during the spring. We always do extremely well during Formal Rush which is in large part due to our amazing Chapter house, which is always regarded as one of the nicest on campus. In addition to the size of our membership, the quality of our membership is extremely important to us and we go to great lengths to rush and sign quality individuals that we feel will continue to improve our Chapter. We have already received many great rush recommendations from alumni, and we ask any alumni that know of a possible rush to please send us their contact information through the Chapter's website, www.gamma-o. org. We greatly appreciate all rush recommendations and they are a great resource to our Rush Chairmen.



### **G-O On Campus**

Gamma-O continues to have a large presence in all aspects of the Greek Community at KU. We had two brothers run for IFC Executive Board positions, and and two other brothers

were selected for IFC appointed positions. Many of our freshmen are also extremely active in the Junior Greek Council, and Dustan Boleski '09 holds a position on the Junior Greek Council Executive Board. Driven by an ultimate goal of bringing home another championship trophy this spring, the Chapter fields teams in all campus intramural sports and competes against teams from every fraternity on campus. We make an effort to support all of the other Greek houses on campus by participating in their philanthropies, and many brothers are involved in Greek affiliated community service organizations. Natural Ties is an organization that partners a mentally handicapped person to each Greek chapter. The organization holds weekly events for all of the participants to come together and partake in a fun activity. Gamma-O always has avid participation in the organization and currently has three Natural Ties. Nick Barr '08 and Tyler Setter '08 are on the Executive Board, and T.J. Trum '04 is the organization's President. We also have brothers participating in Adopt-A-School, a program that places members of the Greek Community in local elementary school classrooms to help the teachers and interact with the children. Finally, Gamma-O is devoted to its involvement in Greek Tutoring, a program which provides students free tutoring by fellow members of the Greek Community. With such extensive involvement within the Greek Community and our outstanding academic performance last semester, we are hoping to have another successful Greek Awards Night on April 25th. Gamma-O is poised to bring home several IFC awards this year, and our goal is to beat last year's haul of six awards.



## **Philanthropy**

We have again set a goal of 20 community service hours and \$20 donated to philanthropy for each member this semester, and we completed this goal for last semester. We feel very strongly about giving back to the community, and hold all of our members responsible for reaching their goal. In addition to our member's individual goals, Gamma-O has again donated \$1,000 to Kappa Sigma's Military Heroes Campaign. The Military Heroes Campaign is a great cause, and its efforts go directly to the Fisher House Foundation. The Fisher House Foundation builds housing, known as Fisher Houses, in which the families of injured soldiers can stay for free while their loved one receives long-term treatment in a military hospital. From 2007-2009, the Military Heroes Campaign raised \$117,000 for the Fisher House to be constructed at the Washington D.C. Veteran's Hospital. It was recently announced that the D.C. Fisher House will be named after Brother Robert J. Dole '42, which I'm sure is a great honor for Brother Dole and is a very proud moment for Gamma-Omicron. Kappa Sigma has set another goal to raise \$100,000 in the next two years for the Military Heroes Campaign. ## House Corporation Board Report

You'll read elsewhere in this GO-LITE issue about the many accomplishments and activities of the Chapter, Parents Club, etc. While they should make all alums proud, I won't repeat that information and want to first mention and welcome our new Housemother, Patricia Harbaugh. Mom Harbaugh was interviewed by chapter officers, Bill Buck, and me, and all were highly impressed. She is a Kansas native, and prior to Kappa Sig had been Housemother at Sigma Kappa sorority in that outpost of civilization-KSU.

She has brought an energy that has been manifested in many ways, ranging from the aesthetic-plantings around the exterior, to the basic- making sure the vacuum cleaners are emptied and properly used (not as simple as it sounds, to be sure). Steve Bader and I have worked closely with Mom Harbaugh and have been pleased and impressed, particularly with the care she utilizes to ensure that all bills for repairs are accurate and reflect work that was ordered and properly executed. Mom Harbaugh also has sons so she brings a familiarity with the antics of young males and so manages a balance between discipline and tolerance that have made for a great environment for the guys.

I mentioned repairs to the house, and let me spend a minute on the condition of our 100+ year-old chapter house. Those of us who lived there in the 50's-early 90's might not recognize the place (although the Crest Room is pretty much the same as it has been for 60 years). While the structure itself is sound and as solid as ever, we've managed to consistently upgrade some of the items related to both comfort and academic effectiveness. Most notably, we added a fiber optic DSL system that has delivered fast and reliable internet access throughout the house; it's quite something to visit the house on a weekday night and see literally dozens of guys, sometimes with teammates from classes, using that system. I remain convinced that the high-speed system also enhances download and utilization of some cinematic masterpieces (no more need be said), so numerous "needs" are met.

We've also benefited enormously from the assistance of one of the dads, George Foree, who has applied his furniture industry skills and knowledge to arrange for cost-reduced upgrades to mattresses and Crest Room and dining room chairs, and he has even applied his own "elbow grease" to fixing up some of our furniture. He may not be a Kappa Sig by initiation but is one in spirit!

A few areas will need sprucing up, the main floor carpet seems to be possessed and the Library furniture and walls and wallpaper could use some face-lifting. But overall, we have a facility that compares to any at KU and may be the finest in all of Kappa Sigma!

One of the benefits of the chapter's rush effort has been that the corporation and chapter are on very sound financial footing. By maintaining a near-capacity headcount, we are able to offer a reward to seniors living in, in order to encourage them to stay engaged with the chapter. Next school year, our housebill will be essentially identical to the costs for university dorms, and, beyond the benefits of Kappa Sigma itself, the house bill includes numerous benefits not provided in dorms. The chapter has ample funding for several first-class social events, including the Black and White which was held at the brand-new, and quite unique, OREAD Hotel, located on the ground once occupied by the Gaslight Pub. The OREAD's architecture is striking, using limestone throughout, but it's debatable if progress really occurs when new joints displace pubs, most of all loss of The Stables. But the lads of Kappa Sigma will no doubt manage. We have retired the mortgage, and the Corporation Board is now focusing on effective use of operating funds freed up as a result.

I'd like to close with a nod to Darcy Domoney for organizing a repeat reunion of guys initiated in the early 70's, and to encourage all alums to visit the house on football game days and any time you're in Lawrence. We have a great chapter in a great chapter house at a great university!
